Mission Statement

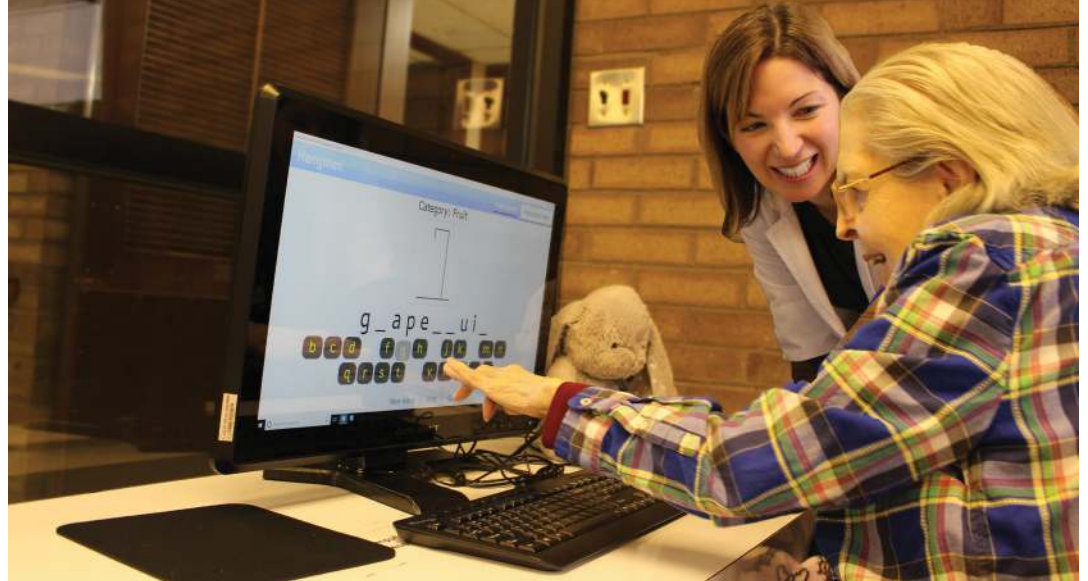

Tech Therapy: Keeping Residents Engaged and Alert with Linked Senior

Here at our Home, we emphasize and practice a holistic approach to the care of the elderly poor, monitoring physical, spiritual, social, cultural, psychological, and environmental aspects of their health. One of the biggest challenges we face, like most in long-term care, is addressing mental health conditions like dementia, and relieving behavioral and psychological symptoms like loneliness, helplessness, and boredom. Linked Senior, purchased by the Home through a grant from a private foundation and individual donors, is a valuable tool in this pursuit, as it aims to improve brain health and non-pharmacological wellness for Residents in long-term care. The program runs on a computer, and allows Residents to access cognitive, occupational, physical, and speech therapy options with content tailored specifically to them.

Recently we sat in with Resident Ann Adams as she worked with the program, and had such fun watching as she enjoyed a matching card game, hang man, trivia,

and funny videos. It was amazing to see her engage with each new activity, utilizing different skills, memories, and information to solve puzzles and play games. Ann shared laughs with occupational therapist Julie Brogan as she worked, but Linked Senior allows for any staff member, volunteer, or family member to engage Residents. Through the visual and mental experiences in the program, Residents can exercise memory and brain fitness, positively impacting the social, spiritual, intellectual, and physical aspects of their lives.

Benefits of these types of enrichment activities include reducing anxiety, falls, and the use of anti-psychotic drugs, improving cognitive abilities, and increasing the levels of Residents' social engagement. Linked Senior has been a great addition to our Home, as another tool we can use to ensure our Residents are getting the best care possible, with access to leading technology. We are grateful for the special funding we received for this valuable program.

Mother's Challenge dollars become a new nurse call system to keep Residents better connected to the nurses providing compassionate, around the clock care.

While some people might not notice these things, to us they are what define the dinner and have kept it going these 44 years, just as it is often the unseen things that sustain our Home. You, the donor who sends in a couple dollars when you can or who drops by to lend an hour or two to make beds or share stories with our Residents, are an integral part of our story. Even if we have never seen your face, we have seen and felt your love. We see it in the way a Resident relaxes into life at the Home, content in the knowledge that they are loved and cared for by so many people they have never even met. We see it in the laughs and smiles they share as they make friends in the dining room over a good meal, or share quiet moments of prayer in the chapel. Whether you are right down the road or hours away, your generosity and compassion are ever present, and we could not be more grateful.

Mark Lane, who served as Diocesan Administrator since the passing of Bishop DiLorenzo, as well as his brother, Fr. Mark Knestout, pastor of St. Bartholomew's in Bethesda, MD.

His first stop on his mini-tour of our Home was a visit to the chapel, where he knelt for a quick prayer as the Sisters sang Hail Mary.
